





For a community of our size and circumstances, we stand out at \$48.8M in assets." ~Beverly Matthews

During Beverly's 10-year tenure:

- Established 202 new funds.
- During Matthews' leadership tenure, the Foundation raised \$17.6M in donations.
- The Foundation grew from \$26.4M to \$48.8M.
- Successfully met the challenge of two Giving Indiana Funds for Tomorrow (GIFT) Matching Grants that brought \$1.25M to the Foundation.
- Provided \$250,000 and partnered with Henry County government, Henry County Hospital Foundation and five private donors to establish Ivy Tech Community College locally.
- In 2013, the Foundation hosted the first Women's Gala and the ladies involved have given away to local nonprofits over \$41,000 and helped grow the Women's Circle of Friends Endowment to over \$37,000.
- Started Henry County's first "Match Day" in 2017 with the Foundation's support of \$100,000 and raising over \$349,000 in one day for ten local nonprofits.

- For the first time in the history of Henry County, New Castle Little League was a contender in the Little League World Series and the Foundation partnered with some private donors and provided \$10,000 in match money and raised \$23,221 in five days to help get the local team members to the tournament.
- Provided a match grant of \$300,000 for the Henry County Expo Center.
- Partnered with donors and other funders to provide additional support to New Castle Parks and Henry County Humane Society.

KEEP MOVING FORWARD

here were many days in 2020 when we faced the unknown. As the number of individuals contracting COVID-19 grew, it became less of a question, if we knew anyone with it, but a shudder of dismay upon hearing who was most recently sick. 'How bad are they?'

As the world tackled the pandemic, stay-at-home orders were issued, businesses were shut down, and work continued at home, if possible. Schools grappled with how to continue educating children while the internet and computers were not available to everyone. Parents working from home struggled to find childcare for young children now in virtual learning. Work/life balance had a whole new meaning.

With the unknown, store shelves became empty. Hand sanitizer and Clorox became hot commodities. Masks became mandated and we questioned if we should wear gloves into the store. Factories shut down due to outbreaks, so items like meat and toilet paper became scarce. Fear gripped our nation.

Keep moving forward.

The ugly head of social injustice surfaced and equality in healthcare was questioned. Riots and peaceful vigils alike were held to bring a voice to those who felt voiceless. The nation wrestled with a political division that divided neighbors and families.

Keep moving forward.

Words like 'the new norm' began circulating as mask mandates extended, gathering limits were placed and celebrations were missed. Drive-by birthdays became a thing and we stood outside nursing homes just to see our loved ones. High school seniors lost out on their lasts—last game, last dance, last day of school—and graduation ceremonies were cancelled. College students were sent home to learn virtually. Without the opportunity for in-person learning, they also missed the unique time of dorm living, such as snacking on ramen noodles with friends while pulling all-nighters.

Keep moving forward.

Our placement of the term hero shifted. We stopped looking to the NFL, NBA, USL and such for people to admire. Instead, we looked next door and in our community to the brave men and women who put themselves at risk every day to care for the sick. EMTs who stepped into homes to carry the weak to the hospital. Doctors and nurses whose faces bore the indentations of masks after 16 hour shifts. Men and women who held hands with the dying, unable to bring them healing. They became our heroes.

Keep moving forward.

We were in it together. We heard the plea for masks within the hospital and we started sewing. We heard the call for basic necessities for those who were without jobs and we gave food and supplies. When someone was sick, we had porch drops where we left soup and a wave from the sidewalk. We did what we could within the unknown.

Keep moving forward.

The Henry County Community Foundation was built to make a difference during moments like these. When the world was shutting down, the endowments at the HCCF were still providing money to the nonprofits on the frontlines. When generous people wanted to give but didn't know where, they gave to the Foundation's emergency fund and the Foundation guided their donations where the needs were the greatest. While we became a part of a world that seemed frozen, we kept moving forward.

In 2020, the Henry County Community Foundation celebrated 35 years of serving Henry County. Due to the restrictions, the celebration was limited to news stories and emails. However, it was fitting to reflect on this anniversary in the year of the unknown because individuals who have given to the foundation in those 35 years made it possible for the Foundation to do its work in the midst of a pandemic.

A gift to an endowment at the Foundation means that gift is invested and never spent. Instead, the earnings off of investment are poured back into the community year after year, no matter what is happening around us. So, we thank those who have supported the work of the Foundation since 1985. Because of you, we kept moving forward in 2020.


mma-Kate Moore, a Knightstown High School senior, is the 2020 recipient of the Henry County Community Foundation Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship.

Pandemic Doesn't Stop the Generosity of the Henry County Community

or 7 years, the women of Henry County have pooled their resources and granted over \$41,000 to 18 different nonprofit organizations through the Women's Circle of Friends Pass Through Fund. These dollars were made available with donations from community women who attend the Women's Circle of Friends Women's Grantmaking Gala in the Fall. However, with restrictions due to the Covid-19 pandemic, what would have been the 8th annual gala was cancelled. This did not stop the generous women with deep Henry County roots. When offered the chance to give—without the opportunity to gather for a fun evening—the ladies came through.

One such donor, Ann McGlothlin, has been contributing and attending the Gala since its inception in 2013. The canceled Gala did not dissuade Ann from giving. "It really doesn't have anything to do with the Gala," Ann stated. "Sure it is a fun evening, but it's an honor to have the opportunity to come together with likeminded women who have charitable hearts to support the people of Henry County," said Ann. "For me, it is the cause and knowing we are supporting people in our community."

Ann, along with 72 other donors, made contributions in 2020. These donations were placed in the Women's Circle of Friends Field of Interest Fund (different than the before mentioned Pass-Through Fund), which has provided \$7,000 in support of girls and women in Henry County.

The ICAP Women's Clinic has received grant dollars from the Women's Circle of Friends Field of Interest Fund and knows firsthand the tremendous impact. "The grant dollars that we have received from the Women's Circle of Friends has enabled us to provide women's health services such as pap tests, pregnancy tests and routine cancer screening," says Nancy Lewis, RN and Women's Clinic Director. "Many times this money helped to fill in the gaps where we did not receive funding from other sources or the funding we had was not adequate."

Nonprofit organizations often struggle to cover expenses with grants because of limiting criteria. However, Nancy appreciates the grants provided through the Women's Circle of Friends are available for her to use where the needs are greatest. "It was always nice to have some dollars that were not earmarked for any particular thing but to be able to use as needed." Nancy adds, "I have been more than grateful for the support and so are the many women you have served."

Keep Moving Forward: In anticipation of fewer restrictions due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the Henry County Community Foundation plans to hold the 8th annual Women's Circle of Friends Grantmaking Gala on September 14, 2021. We are all looking forward to meeting together and continuing the impact in our community.

TASC Builds a Commitment to Community that Lasts

he Teens About Serving the County (TASC) Youth Grants Committee is made up of five student representatives from each of the five school corporations in Henry County. This includes one 8th grader, one freshman, one sophomore, one junior, and one senior from each school. They evaluate grant submissions relating to youth and education programs and receive a budget from the Choose Henry Flex Fund at the Henry County Community Foundation.


Youth Grants Chairman, Rex Peckinpaugh, and Committee Advisor, Susan Falck-Neal, oversee the process and ensure proper procedure is followed.

Traditionally, the TASC Youth Grants committee meets four times each school year, but as with many activities in 2020, they were unable to complete the usual grant cycles during the year. Despite the missed grant-making opportunities, the lessons learned on leadership and giving back to the community continue long after graduation.

Former TASC member, Abby (Rahn) Haworth, became involved with the committee during her time at New Castle Middle School. She recalls, "Someone there saw something in me and encouraged me to apply. I am thankful for individuals in the community and beyond who have invested time to help young individuals see something within themselves. I remember being trusted to make decisions and provide insight for our community. We took the responsibility seriously and it has helped me understand the importance of empowering younger voices."

Since graduating from New Castle High School in 2007, Abby went on to study at Ball State. After achieving a higher education degree in Student Affairs Administration, she now serves as the Director of Student Life at Ball State University. Through this role, she works to make sure students understand philanthropy and engage in conversations of service.

She credits her time on TASC for instilling a deep



love of commitment to community. She expressed, "TASC sparked my joy in community service and giving. It allowed me to view impacts at a very young age. My experience shaped so much of who I am today. I'm grateful for that shoulder tap and opportunity to serve my community!"

Foundation Salutes Eleven Years of Committee Leadership

nightstown resident, Elizabeth "Betts" Adams has been serving the people and places in Henry County for over 15 years through her involvement with the Henry County Community Foundation.

Recognizing her leadership capabilities in 2005, retiring board member Doug Reeves, asked Betts if she had any interest in serving on the Foundation board. "Being an employee and retiree of Eli Lilly and Company, I was aware of the role that the Foundation played in the local coordination of the initiative undertaken by Lilly Endowment to provide full scholarships to deserving students in counties across the state. That connection has always been important to me and was a major reason I chose to become involved with the Foundation," said Adams.

"As was customary after a year of service, new board members were

assigned to a board committee. I was assigned to the Scholarship Committee and was mentored by the two anchoring members, Herb Bunch and Dr. Ray Pavy, to whom I will always be grateful. I subsequently became the Chair of the committee and maintained that role through the "scholarship season" of 2019-2020," described Adams.

"Little did the Foundation know at that time a leader was emerging who would manage the growing scholarship program that helps define the importance of youth and education in the community, awarding nearly \$400,000 in 2020 alone," said Beverly Matthews, President of the Foundation.

"A community foundation is made up of donors, board members, committee members and staff, but none require as much volunteer time as the Scholarship Chair," added Matthews. "Betts has participated in 14 scholarship seasons, overseeing 11 of those with 15 plus committee members and five scholarship coordinators and managed it flawlessly."

"I'm very grateful to the volunteers who were willing to serve on the Scholarship Committee during my tenure as chair. They answered my calls when application packets were ready for review and took our assignments seriously," said Betts.

A native Cincinnatian, her job at Lilly and her marriage to dentist Elliott Adams led them to make Knightstown their home and raise their two daughters. Betts is also a Girl Scout volunteer for over 30 years and a 40-year member of the Knightstown chapter of Tri Kappa sorority.

VOUR INPACT

The Henry County Community Foundation is a place for everyone to make their impact and keep our community moving forward.

In the following pages, you will read stories about how your neighbors have made the place we live and work—or the place we came from—better through establishing funds at the Foundation. These stories are just a snapshot of the incredible things happening because of generous people, just like you. **Donor Advised Fund:** A Donor Advised Fund provides a tax benefit now but allows you to choose a different beneficiary each year. In 2020, the HCCF awarded \$121,474.91 to organizations recommended by donors.

Designated Fund: Designated Funds are established by donors to benefit a specific organization. In 2020, the HCCF awarded \$310,179.31 in grants to organizations.

Field of Interest Fund: A Field of Interest Fund allows donors to address specific issues or causes. In 2020, the HCCF awarded \$47,320.00 to organizations.

Org. Agency Fund: Organizations can create endowment funds as a way to secure their future. In 2020, the HCCF granted \$67,707.00 to organizations.

Scholarship Fund: Scholarship funds are great for donors wishing to invest in Henry County through higher education. In 2020, the HCCF awarded \$389,933.28 to students of Henry County.

Choose Henry Flex Fund: Grants from the Choose Henry Flex Fund are unrestricted dollars to support local organizations as they meet the needs of our community. In 2020, the HCCF awarded \$470,343.73 to organizations in Henry County.

A total of \$1,406,958.23 was given in 2020 to support our community.

Perfect Timing for Park Improvements

ach New Year, we anticipate the new experiences ahead of us. Through the dark and cold of winter, we often look forward to warm weather and sunshine. We become eager for playdates at the playground, family reunions at the parks, and all of the great outdoor activities available to us.

The year 2020 had something different ahead for all of us. After months of uncertainty, fear, and distance, more than ever, we were all ready to get out, get moving, and safely see our loved ones. We started walking on trails together, having more picnics, and enjoying each other's presence in the open air.

But with Covid-19 also came many budget cuts. Several projects were paused or even cancelled. The Parks Department was not exempt from these discouraging experiences. Projects that were underway for two local parks would no longer be funded due to lockdown. So, Parks Board President, Patty Broyles, came to the Henry County Community Foundation to ask for help.

Patty expressed to HCCF President, Beverly Matthews, "The possibility of finishing the plans at these parks would increase the recreational opportunities, provide for a safe environment, and most importantly, instill a sense of pride within the neighborhoods."

After hearing from Patty, Beverly knew just the right donors to contact. She shared, "I felt bad that they weren't going to be able to do the projects when everyone was outside more using these spaces. I reached out to two funders who I thought would like to see a project giving back to the community."

Beverly had already started a conversation with the Bowers family about their fund before the parks project had surfaced. Doug Bowers recalled, "We had talked to Beverly. We asked her to provide us with some ideas that would make sense for our fund. We hadn't done anything yet since establishing the fund. She came up with some cool ideas. This was all going on during the pandemic. There were so many things we could have done. There's no wrong answer, but I will say that we voted on a couple of options of where to contribute. Each of the seven people involved got to vote, and it was unanimous that we would fund this renovation."

Doug Bowers is the sixth of seven children whose parents raised their family in New Castle. All of the children grew up here and graduated from Walter P. Chrysler High School. Some of the children moved away after high school, but Lynn Bowers stayed and became a doctor here. He and his wife, Cassandra, initially started a fund through the Foundation in their names. After his passing, the family asked for contributions to the fund in his memory. Later, they continued that request when another of the siblings, Stuart, passed away.

Meanwhile, Carol and Maurie Goodwin had started a fund in honor of Carol's parents, George and Rilla Denton. Carol stated, "We always believed in the Foundation and think it's a wonderful thing. Both of my parents were citizens

of the year and greatly involved in the community. Both of them had businesses downtown and were very active in Henry County. My mother was a real trailblazer for her generation. We wanted something that would give back to the community and this fund really fit the bill for my parents."

When they learned about the parks needing funding, they found it to be the perfect way to use their fund, and they readily agreed to it.

Carol expressed, "It's something the community benefits from and it helps in so many different ways. The parks are a health resource. They beautify. They give something for kids and adults to do. It's a win-win all the way around. My nephews used to play a lot of basketball at Osborne Park. When we found out that there was a need, we both said 'Yes, let's do that! Use whatever funds are available to help out.""

Once both funders were on board with the project, Parks Director, Mike Bergum, sent them information about the scope of the project and Beverly kept them informed throughout the process of renovations. She shared, "Both of these funders lived here and cared about the community. I was thrilled that they wanted to do that and see something they were supporting in their hometown. It really helped the community at a time that people needed it the most."

The support from the George and Rilla Denton Memorial Fund and Dr. Lynn Bowers & Cassandra Bowers and Stuart & Joan Bowers Family Fund helped Osborne Park receive new basketball goals, a resurfaced court, new trash cans, and refurbished picnic tables. Hospital Heights received new basketball goals, a resealed court, and a new trash can as well.

Both families have been pleased with the project. Doug said, "The Parks commission had been looking to resurface the basketball courts. We elected to help with that. Everyone was happy with it. We saw the pictures of the park. There was one colorful artist. It was very neat."

And Carol summed up their feelings in stating, "We're just thrilled to death that the money was used for something so worthwhile and that we were contacted."

Through all of the bleak moments and struggles of 2020, our community was able to keep moving forward to improve both Osborne and Hospital Heights Parks because of these generous funds. Now, they're each bright spots in Henry County that people will enjoy for years to come.

s a Chrysler worker and a third grade teacher at Tri, James and Carolyn Garvin spent most of their lives in New Castle. They grew up in Henry County, married, had children, attended First United Methodist Church, joined the Kiwanis Club, volunteered with Habitat for Humanity, and supported Henry County Community Foundation.

James and Carolyn had a heart for this community and wanted to continue giving back. The Foundation was one of the ways they were able to do that. They started a designated fund to continually give to the organizations they cared about deeply. Their son, Stu Garvin, explained, "It was their hope, and ours as well, to contribute to New Castle."

Then, when they both had passed away, we contributed to the animal shelter and had a plaque placed in their names."

The Garvin children, Stu, Jan, and Mark, grew up in Henry County and graduated from New Castle High School. They have all since moved to other parts of the United States, but they continue to visit each year. During one of their visits to James and Carolyn's gravesite, they decided to stop by the animal shelter and see the plaque. Stu described their time at the shelter, "It was unbelievable how nice it was up front, but the dog area was in serious need of upgrades. I went to them and asked what they needed. We learned that they wanted to do some work but hadn't been able to. I knew Mom and Dad would want us to help." Initially, the Garvin children had hoped to be able to fully fund the project through their parents' fund. When the expenses exceeded, they decided to pool their money together and cover the costs. Along the way, the shelter found more issues that needed to be addressed with their building and learned that it would take more funding to complete the necessary upgrades. From there, they applied for a grant through the Foundation to help finish the project. It all finally came together.

The work was done in phases throughout the year 2020. They received new lights, replacement windows, freshly painted floors, upgraded air-flow system, and sound-dampening foam for the walls. The foundation was repaired, a concrete curb was put into place, a French drain was installed, and vinyl siding was added.

The Garvin siblings were able to come and see the renovations together, and they were really happy to see all of the improvements for the animals, the staff, and everyone that experiences the animal shelter. •



LEGACY GIVING Honorary Scholarship Fund Leads to the Gift of a Lifetime

A long with winning the IHSAA Class 2A Girls Basketball Tournament during the 2002-2003 school year, Shenandoah player, Amanda Norris, was awarded the Mental Attitude Award. This award also provides \$1,000 to the school corporation from Farm Bureau Insurance. Just a few years after this event, another Shenandoah student, Kara Keesling, was given this same honor.

At the time, the high school administration decided the best use of the funds was to give back to their students through scholarships. After the second student was awarded and the school received more award money, former principal and current Henry County Community Foundation board member, Charley Willis, decided to start a scholarship with the Henry County Community Foundation. This scholarship came to be known as the Rick Penn Honorary Scholarship.



Rick Penn graduated from Peru High School, attended basic training at Fort Sheridan, earned the rank of Staff Sergeant, graduated from Ball State with a degree in English and followed it with a Masters in the same. Then, in the fall of 1973, he made his way to Henry County.

He started teaching a full schedule of classes at Shenandoah High School. There, he also coached baseball and basketball and later became the high school athletic director, as well as the chair of the English Department.

Charley Willis, who was the Shenandoah High School principal during Rick's tenure, worked closely with Rick for years. He shared, "Rick easily did the work of 3 full time employees. In the classroom, Rick taught senior level English and Government. The last few years, this included 2 dual credit English courses. Even in retirement, he taught these courses. Rick also taught government in summer school. This allowed students room in their schedules so they could participate in vocational programs in New Castle or Anderson."

During his time at Shenandoah, Rick received the HCCF Teacher Excellence Award. He expressed, "I have often said that Shenandoah has good young people who are surrounded by good adults. To me, the award is a reflection of all the positive impact that working together has done for our community."

Charley Willis sees the award as a reflection of the hard work and dedication that Rick applied to his roles at Shenandoah. He said, "During my 40 years as an educator, I have never seen anyone give more to a school and community than Rick Penn."

Rick and his wife, JoAnn, saw this scholarship as an opportunity to continually give back to the students and the school he devoted so much of his time and energy to. Having received a grant from his church in Peru when he went to Ball State, he understands how much extra help can make a difference to each student. As they discussed their estate, Rick and JoAnn decided to include the Henry County Community Foundation and their scholarship fund in their plans. Rick explained, "We hope to help future students get an education and remember that our scholarship helped them. Then, when they have the opportunity, they can set up funds with the Foundation, too. Through this process, we will continue the concept of giving back to the community!" •

ssues of mental health surfaced during the year 2020. Companies like Meridian Health Services (Meridian) saw so much need. President and CEO, Hank Milius, stated, "Meridian was turned on a dime to cope with the Coronavirus pandemic of 2020, moving our staff to remote offices where necessary, while expanding our telehealth/virtual operations for both medical and behavioral health."



Serving 33 counties in Indiana, Meridian provides primary care, dental, and mental health services to children, adolescents, adults, and geriatric patients. They serve nearly 40,000 patients and are continuing to grow through new and existing programs.

With the curveball of Covid-19, Meridian was forced to move in a new direction at an accelerated pace through providing more virtual services. They went from 1,000 virtual visits in April of 2019 to 33,000 in April of 2020. Hank Milius described, "Even at the height of the pandemic, many of our frontline healthcare heroes stayed on the job, along with the rest of our essential workers who tirelessly served to ensure patients received services throughout our communities."

Regional Vice President for Madison, Delaware, and (soon) Henry Counties, Lisa Suttle, saw the difficulties throughout the year as well as the positive outcomes involved. She shared, "We couldn't have done that if we wanted to before, but we got it figured out. In many ways, it's been nice for our patients. We're really happy about being able to provide those services. It's also helped us to provide more of our services in other counties. We're been able to expand and grow in other counties and offer more services in more places."

Meridian focuses on "whole-person" health care. They integrate physical, mental, and social well-being to help people achieve their optimum health. During the global pandemic of 2020, they were providing services to Henry County and surrounding areas to help citizens reach and maintain their "whole-person" health. Through a time when businesses, families, and communities were struggling the most, Meridian was able to make adjustments and meet the mental health needs of our region.

It's like a second language. We wanted him to be able to communicate with his dad and hopefully be able to interpret one day."

The Ford family found out about a class being offered at Ivy Tech that would be a step toward being able to become certified as an interpreter. In order to complete the class, they needed some financial help to cover the costs. The Foundation saw this as a great opportunity to use the All 4 Kids fund. When Melissa was contacted about this plan of action for her fund, she was thrilled. She expressed, "I thought it was very sweet. It really tugged at my heart."

Despite the changing situation with Covid-19, Andrew was able to complete the course through Ivy Tech. He attended most of the class sessions in person. As the world shifted through the pandemic, the class finished with videos and emailed assignments.

The Ford family is already seeing the benefits of what Andrew learned through this course. He uses FaceTime to help communicate with doctors for his father, and he goes to the grocery to help with purchases and needs there. Andrew shared, "This class has shown me new signs. Some of them were different then what I had learned because it

evolved over time. It helped me learn more than what my dad was able to teach me. It has made a difference. I'm able to sign with my father more instead of having to spell some things out. I have more signs to use!" •

Melissa shared: Though she had been involved with several projects over the years, most of her activities revolved around her husband Nathan's position as a cardiologist. She wanted to make something her own.

Committed to Caring & Living Tall

Editor's Note: Rosemary Muncy led the nonprofit, Cancer Society of Henry County, in the 1970s to help local cancer patients with needed equipment, supplies & gas cards to get to their treatment. Rosemary passed away on January 6, 2020, but not without securing funds to help people in the future. She was a volunteer & when she could no longer serve in this capacity, she entrusted the Henry County Community Foundation & created the Cancer Society of Henry County Field of Interest Fund in 2015, so cancer patients could be helped forever. This is an edited story by Rosemary's daughter, sharing what she learned from her mother. Rosie was the ultimate volunteer, philanthropist, rich in spirit, generosity and commitment.

s it possible to live tall when you're 5'2"? Our mom did; she was like a stick of dynamite. She lived tall because if she set her mind to do something, she pushed until it was done right. She was a proud woman and a faithful servant to God. She taught us early the commitment of giving and unselfish acts.

Rosie was the granddaughter and niece of Methodist Ministers. They taught her the Bible was more than just a book, but a way to live and she lived it. Early on in my life, I watched her plan and organize in every group or organization she and my dad were a part of. She called friends and delivered food baskets at the holidays, just because she said we were blessed and some needed help. She said at the end of her day, life must have a purpose.

Known as the cake lady, the caramel lady, and the cancer lady, Rosie worked hard for the people of Henry County. She found her mission with our sorority, Phi Beta, and the Cancer Society of Henry County. She and her friend, Martha, ran a loan closet for medical equipment for people who had cancer. Her office was the kitchen table. We used to have many people come to the front door needing help and she would start looking. Hard to believe, but she met with doctors, administrators, businesses and attended medical conferences on cancers.

She heard Ball Hospital (now IU Health) was thinking of building a cancer center in New Castle and she found her dream. She began making phone calls and attending meetings with directors of the hospital and Forest Ridge until it became a reality. I was lucky to be a part of the journey with her. Her hope was to help give the patients with cancer a place close to home for treatment. To this very day, her name is on a plaque located in the entrance of the facility.

When Henry County Hospital (now Henry Community Health) needed new equipment, they often called and asked if she could help find them money and she always did. She worked feverishly for the youth of Henry County to receive financial help who would enter the field of cancer research or in the medical field and created a scholarship for these students.

Rosie lived for us - her friends, her community, her church, her family, our dad. Some people go through life, just being present, never giving back, never looking for who they can make an impact on, just getting up and moving forward... NOT our mom; She lived tall!

Kiwanis Club Shoe Program Sustained

ith a local poverty rate among children of 16.4%, Henry County schools see a lot of students with a wide range of physical needs. One issue of concern is the need for students to have new shoes that fit. The Kiwanis Club of New Castle has been working to address this through their Shoe Program.

"There is a serious need for this in Henry County. Lots of kids have shoes that are much too big or really worn out," explained member, Irene Hudelson. She went on to share a story from one of her experiences with this program, "One year there was a kid around 9 years old who walked with his legs bowed. He had been wearing his dad's shoes that were passed down from kid to kid in their family. They were held together by tape. Once he got new shoes, he started walking better. His shoes were causing him to walk like that."

For the last five years, the Kiwanis Club has raised funds to help provide shoes for children in several Henry County schools. Partnering with Shoe Sensation and local elementary schools, they supply shoes and socks to hundreds of students each year.

Nurses, principals, and teachers choose students that have a need for new shoes and send paperwork home with them to receive permission for the child to participate in the program. From there, Shoe Sensation goes in to the school to measure feet and set a date to start distribution, and a Kiwanis Club member goes along to give out socks with the shoes.

One unique aspect of this program is the chance to choose. Once distribution begins, Shoe Sensation takes in 3-4 pairs of shoes for each student to pick from. Irene describes this as a "real morale booster for them. Not only do they need the shoes, but having new shoes that they helped pick out gives them improved self-esteem!"

Due to Covid-19, Kiwanis Club was unable to carry out any of their usual fundraisers. They weren't sure if they'd be able to continue the program without some assistance. So, they applied for a grant through the Foundation.

The treasurer of Kiwanis Club, Jon McCutchen, expressed their gratitude, "This grant allowed us to still have the funds to provide shoes and socks to Henry County students. We are so thankful and have already started putting it to good use!"

This year's distribution started in February. They have been to 11 schools and given out 302 pairs of shoes and socks in Henry County. They plan to go to some schools again this coming fall. They're seeing the positive impact this program is having on students. Jon shared, "Their faces are full of excitement as they walk away with their new shoes!"•

essica Hale was preparing to participate in the swine show at the 4-H fair. A 10 year member of 4-H, she loved being involved in the community that it provided. Though she was a freshman in college at that time, she was still looking forward to her final year of participating in the program.

The night before her turn to show her pig, she was involved in a car accident that claimed her life.

As the 4-H fair continued on without her, her two younger brothers stepped in to show her pig.

Then, the time came for the pig to go to auction. At the auction, Jessica's close-knit 4-H community came together. "Everyone was donating money. It went over \$10,000. That's when we decided that we wanted the main qualification for the scholarship recipient to be a 10 year membership in 4-H," shared Julie Hale, Jessica's mom.

Moved by the support and love of the 4-H community, the Hales chose to start a scholarship fund in Jessica's memory. Through the years since it began being offered, Julie has noticed that many of the same names of the families who were there for them and gave to the fund are applying for Jessica's scholarship. She described, "It's always interesting to read their scholarships and see what their goals are. We feel honored that her scholarship is benefiting people that are the same age she was."

Since the scholarship was established, the Hale family has seen it doing good things. "We appreciate recipients sending thank you cards. We know it's helping some get through college. Knowing that it helps others pursue their dreams means a lot to us," expressed Julie.

Another lover of animals, Jessica Wantz, completed many 4-H projects over her 10 years as a member. She was involved with swine, dogs, small pets, vet science, and of course, horse and pony. Her mom, Susie Wantz, said, "She loved all animals, but she was especially crazy about horses. Animals sensed her quiet demeanor and were always at ease with her, as if she could communicate with them."

Jessica didn't spend all of her time at 4-H. She was also involved with youth group, worship band, marching band, and drum line. Though she started her education at New Castle, she went on to study at the Academy where she was also involved with theater. Jessica found the time to volunteer at two different veterinarian offices for internships and even mentored at-risk middle school girls.

One student who has had the honor of receiving both the Jessica Hale Memorial-Henry Co. 4-H Scholarship and the Jessica Lynn Wantz Memorial 4-H Scholarship is able to pursue her dreams through the aid provided by these funds.

Elizabeth LaMar comes from a family of long-time 4-H members. She herself spent 10 years in the program, was a co-fair queen in high school, and even participated in an internship with the local 4-H extension office. Through that internship, she was able to help plan the fair and work in youth outreach, as well as revamp their online presence.

Elizabeth graduated from Taylor University where she studied Public Health with a minor in Orphans and Vulnerable Children. She hopes to continue her education through a dental hygiene program, but her passions go beyond dental health and education. Elizabeth dreams to one day operate a farm that helps with teens in the foster care system. She expressed, "I have a goal to do my day job and then come home and connect kids to Christ through creation. It would provide an opportunity for foster teens to grow and learn through routine farm work and animal therapy."

This passion ties in well with Elizabeth's experience in 4-H, and she has been able to pursue her goals through the assistance of these scholarships. She shared, "It has made Taylor University much more affordable for us. It has really decreased the financial burden for my family. It helps tremendously!" The memories of Jessica Hale and Jessica Wantz are kept alive through their funds by providing opportunities for students like Elizabeth.

No problem! You can build your fund over a five-year period. With just \$83 a month, you can create a Designated Fund in just 5 years. Don't need birthday and Christmas presents? Others can give to help you create your fund as well. The minimum amount for an endowed fund is \$5,000 or \$25,000 depending on the fund type (see pages 11-21).



Myth #3: HCCF stockpiles the donations.

Not at all. We invest donations given to the Foundation because we believe in the long-term support of our community. Please visit page 25 where you will find a chart explaining how your gifts will grow and provide more back into the community than you could even imagine! And, you might consider this—if you support a particular nonprofit with an annual gift, that support stops when you pass away. But, if you create a fund at HCCF, your donation continues forever, and your impact grows!



Myth #4: I can only support local organizations with a fund at HCCF.

While most of our donors choose to support local causes, others support regional and national organizations. You can do that with the Foundation, too.


